DIRECTOR'S NOTE

While I love Wilson's work - the way his dialogue crackles, punctuating gut punches with harsh realities while slithering in humorous quips - I had no reason to believe as a white-presenting Latino that I would go near his work as an artist. Yet here we are.

August Wilson (1945-2005) is undeniably one of the most prolific Black American Playwrights to date. His work is frequently studied in the high school classroom, alongside Lorraine Hansberry's *A Raisin in the Sun*, for the way it challenges audiences to examine what it means to be Black in America. Wilson went so far as to pen ten plays known as the American Century Cycle. Each play takes place in a different decade from 1900s-1990s and examines how universal themes and ideologies uniquely impact Black American life over the landscape of time.

Wilson's father, a Sudeten German immigrant, was mostly absent, so he was raised by his Black mother. Being biracial, Wilson struggled with identity. When his mother remarried following the divorce to his father, his family fell victim to much scorn. Wilson dropped out of high school multiple times, working odd-jobs to hide the fact he wasn't going to school. An undisputed bibliophile, he earned an honorary diploma for spending so much time in the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh reading works by prolific Black writers. Against his mother's wishes, he pursued a career in writing and began writing plays. Among those early plays was Jitney.

Despite *Jitney* being the first play Wilson wrote for the American Century Cycle, it was the last to make it to Broadway. Wilson would continue to edit and re-write *Jitney*, playing in smaller theatres and Off-Broadway houses, while his subsequent plays would take on the big stages. In 2017, 12 years after Wilson's death, Manhattan Theatre Club brought *Jitney* to the Samuel J. Friedman Theatre on Broadway.

Wilson's legacy is undeniable. His work is produced nationally, including in Philly (most notably by Arden Theatre; they're mounting *King Hedley II* in February 2025). George C. Wolfe has committed to producing film adaptations of all 10 of the American Century Cycle plays, with *Fences* and *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom* complete and *The Piano Lesson* coming soon. On October 16, 2005, 14 days after his death, the Virginia Theatre on Broadway was renamed the August Wilson Theatre.

As much as I think it is theatre's job to entertain, it is also the job of modern theatre to challenge the audience to think about the world. Some questions to ponder tonight: What has changed since the 1977 in Wilson's *Jitney*? What problems are we still seeing? How can we be a part of the change we want to see? What is stopping us from being the change? Why does it feel like this play was written only last week?
